For coastal regions like Zanzibar, it offers immense potential to leverage marine assets for development.

Strategically located in the Indian Ocean, Zanzibar's rich marine resources position it to benefit from this model. Dr. Hussein Mwinyi, Zanzibar's 8th President, introduced the Blue Economy concept in 2020, highlighting the surrounding waters as untapped opportunities for tourism, fisheries, marine transportation, and energy. His vision emphasized sustainability and economic growth.

To implement this, Dr. Mwinyi established the Ministry of Blue Economy and Fisheries, which oversees marine resource management and fosters sustainable growth. One of his earliest initiatives was reforming port infrastructure—a cornerstone of the Blue

Economy. Ports, vital for trade and commerce, faced inefficiencies that hindered economic activity and revenue.


In his first 100 days, Dr. Mwinyi visited the Zanzibar Port Corporation (ZPC) to address these challenges. Following his intervention, port revenue surged from 1.4 billion to 2.1 billion Tanzanian shillings in one month, reflecting improved efficiency. Enhanced ports support trade, attract investment, and boost exports, benefiting fisheries, spices, and other industries while increasing Zanzibar's global competitiveness.

Ports also play a key role in tourism by improving ferry and cruise ship services, increasing tourist arrivals, and creating jobs in hospitality and transportation. Similarly, the fisheries sector benefits from modernized landing sites and storage facilities, enabling local fishermen to access larger markets while promoting sustainable practices.

Additionally, port development aligns

with renewable energy goals, supporting offshore projects like wind and tidal energy. Modern infrastructure facilitates the installation of sustainable energy systems, reducing reliance on fossil fuels and advancing Zanzibar's environmental objectives.

he Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC), established by Act No. 1 of 1997, plays a pivotal role in developing Zanzibar's ports under the Ministry Infrastructure and Communication. Operating crucial ports in Unguja and Pemba, ZPC has been instrumental in transforming these maritime gateways into thriving economic hubs. Recent advancements at Mkoani, Shumba, and Wete Ports mark a new chapter in Pemba Island's growth, strengthening trade, tourism, and regional connectivity.

The expansion of Mkoani Port

The expansion of Mkoani Port has positioned it as a central player in Pemba's trade ecosystem. A monumental

milestone was achieved when the first container vessel docked at Mkoani Port on September 30, 2024. This historic event allows cargo to arrive directly in Pemba, eliminating the need to transfer goods through Malindi Port. This upgrade, part of a \$3.5 million investment, will process up to thirty thousand TEUs annually, facilitating the export of



key products such as cloves, seaweed, and fish. Enhanced warehousing and cold storage facilities will ensure local industries transition toward value-added exports, reducing logistics costs and supporting Zanzibar's blue economy strategy.

With its transition from a general cargo and passenger port to a containerized facility, Mkoani Port will revolutionize local trade. Improved infrastructure will benefit producers in the agriculture and fishing industries, allowing exports of cloves, bananas, and processed seaweed to reach external markets more efficiently. This development reduces marginal costs for goods movement and accelerates growth for local industries. By prioritizing value-added exports, the port aligns with Zanzibar's vision to increase economic returns for its producers and foster sustainable development.

Upgraded ferry services and larger vessels at Mkoani Port have significantly enhanced connectivity between Pemba and Unguja. These developments not only facilitate smoother passenger movement but also streamline cargo operations. Strengthened regional integration enables local businesses to expand their markets and foster cross-island collaboration, further boosting economic activities on both islands.

Shumba Port, situated in Micheweni

Shumba Port, situated in Micheweni, is undergoing a \$4–6 million upgrade to become a significant passenger terminal. This project aims to establish a key maritime border link between Tanzania and Kenya, offering a direct 90-minute ferry connection to Mombasa at an affordable fare of approximately \$50. The initiative will enhance regional connectivity, fostering economic growth through expanded trade and tourism.





The Shumba Passenger Terminal is set to transform Pemba into a gateway between Tanzania-Zanzibar and Kenya, strengthening cross-border ties. By facilitating quicker and cheaper access to markets, the terminal is expected to boost trade flows and create new opportunities for local businesses. It also opens doors for tourism, encouraging travelers to explore both nations seamlessly.

This affordable and efficient ferry service is designed to increase the movement of people, goods, and services, driving socio-economic growth. The project aligns with Zanzibar's development goals and will generate employment for Micheweni residents during construction and operation.

Beyond infrastructure, the terminal is a catalyst for regional development, connecting East Africa more effectively. With its potential to reshape the economic and social landscape, the Shumba Passenger Terminal promises a prosperous future for both Tanzania and Kenya.

Wete Port

The ongoing port developments are set to spur economic growth, create jobs, and improve living standards for Pemba residents. Increased trade and tourism will provide new opportunities for local businesses, while ZPC's commitment to training programs will equip locals with the skills required for emerging industries. This holistic approach fosters inclusive growth, ensuring that the benefits of modernization are widely shared.

The upgrades at Mkoani, Shumba, and Wete Ports align with Zanzibar's vision to establish itself as a regional maritime leader. Investments in infrastructure, such as cold storage, passenger terminals, and ferry services, strengthen Pemba's economic resilience. Improved connectivity to key markets, including Kenya, will further position Pemba Ports as a driver of economic transformation.









Modernization

Zanzibar relied heavily on the Malindi Port, which was established in 1925 as a small, lighter port; Malindi Port developed into Zanzibar's primary hub for passenger and cargo transport. The facility accommodates approximately 1.5 million passengers annually and manages between 140,000 and 160,000 tonnes of general encompassing petroleum products and edible oils. Despite its importance, Malindi Port encounters challenges such as delays in container clearance, insufficient space, and congestion. These issues frustrate traders diminish government revenue, impacting Zanzibar's economy.

The Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar through Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC), has implemented various measures to address these challenges. The initiatives involve modernizing Malindi Port via collaborations with international firms and seeking Public-Private Partnerships (PPP) to establish new ports throughout Unguja.

Unguja's Maritime Agreement For The **Management Of Malindi Port**

On May 18, 2023, Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC) signed a five-year agreement with Africa Global Logistics (AGL) to manage the Malindi Port container facility. Zanzibar Multipurpose Terminal (ZMT), an AGL subsidiary, began operations on September 18, 2023, focusing on productivity, infrastructure maintenance, and operational modernization. ZMT handles containers, breakbulk, conventional vessels, and Dhows, connecting Zanzibar to the mainland and offering cargo handling and maritime services.

ZMT absorbed 400 former ZPC employees and provided training on quality and safety standards. Investments aim to modernize infrastructure to facilitate efficient imports and exports in accordance with global standards. Since AGL's takeover, revenue has increased by 15%, ship waiting times have dropped by 75%, and container offloading times have reduced from 40 to 10 days. The agreement allocates 30% of revenue to the Zanzibar government and 70% to AGL, covering operational costs. Monthly revenue previously ranged from 4.0 to 4.6bn/-.

Inauguration Of The Inland Container Depot (Icd) In Maruhubi

On October 18, Zanzibar celebrated a historic milestone with the launch of the Zanzibar Inland Container Depot (ICD) at Maruhubi. This \$5 million initiative, a partnership between Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC) and Africa Global Logistics (AGL), is set to transform freight handling and storage, enhancing trade efficiency and competitiveness. The government provided the land, while AGL oversaw construction and delivered advanced equipment, including two 45-ton Reachstackers, a 25-ton mobile crane, and a 550 kVA generator.

The ICD boasts extensive container yards, specialized storage facilities, digital systems for real-time freight monitoring, and automated customs clearance. It also prioritizes sustainability with energy-efficient systems and eco-friendly materials, establishing Zanzibar as a leading logistics and trade hub.



In celebration of the 60th Revolution Anniversary, Zanzibar's revolutionary government partnered with Fumba Inland Container Depot Limited (FICDF) to establish Fumba Port, the island's first privately developed port under a public-private partnership. This milestone marks significant progress in enhancing Zanzibar's port infrastructure, boosting trade capacity, and driving economic growth.

During the inauguration, Dr. Hussein Ali Mwinyi emphasized the importance of private-sector collaboration in national development, stating that relying solely on the public sector is insufficient. He noted that the government partnered with investors to address Malindi Port's overcapacity.

The Fumba Port project, valued at \$15 million, is being implemented in two phases. The first phase began in May 2023, following an agreement with the Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC). The second phase includes constructing a ship ramp, container yard, offices, and advanced technical systems. The port aims to reduce transportation costs and alleviate congestion at Malindi Port.







Mangapwani Port: Prospects For Zanzibar's Trade

The Mangapwani Multipurpose Port stands as a transformative project poised to reshape Zanzibar's maritime industry. Strategically located on the northwest coast of Unguja Island, this cutting-edge facility is set to become a pivotal hub for trade and logistics across Eastern and Southern Africa. With an impressive capacity to handle 1 million TEUs, the port will enhance cargo operations, streamline the movement of goods, and reduce logistical delays, firmly establishing Zanzibar as a key transshipment center connecting regional and global markets.

Designed with versatility in mind, the port's multipurpose facilities go beyond cargo handling, potentially supporting

passenger services and diverse maritime operations. It includes deep-sea berths, modern terminals, oil and gas storage, ship repair facilities, and an industrial business complex. These features will not only support peripheral cities but also position Mangapwani Port as an industrial and logistical node of regional significance.

The project promises far-reaching economic benefits, generating thousands of jobs, fostering skills development, and stimulating agriculture, manufacturing, and tourism. As a symbol of Zanzibar's ambition to become a regional economic leader, the Mangapwani Port underscores a vision of sustainable growth, connectivity, and prosperity.







Mpigaduri

On January 18, 2024, as Zanzibar prepared to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of its Revolution, Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC) signed a concession agreement with the Dutch-led Zanzibar Ferry Development Company (ZF Devco) to develop a state-of-the-art passenger and RoRo ferry terminal. ZF Devco, part of an international consortium including Dutch and Tanzanian firms like Delta Marine Consultants and Kengo TZ, will oversee the \$350+ million project aimed at alleviating congestion at the aging Malindi port.

The project, set in Mpigaduri/Maruhubi on Bububu Road, just four kilometers from Stone Town's current ferry terminal, spans 34 hectares—15 hectares of existing land and 19 reclaimed through dredging. Construction will unfold in two phases over 36 months. Phase 1 (\$250 million) will focus on marine infrastructure and terminal facilities, while Phase 2 (\$100-\$150 million) will establish a special economic zone with hospitality, retail, logistics centers, offices, and an expo hall.

This ambitious development promises to enhance ferry services, address congestion and safety issues, and transform the region into a bustling economic hub. Construction is expected to take 2.5 years, significantly improving Zanzibar's maritime infrastructure and connectivity.

Kizimkazi

The development of Kizimkazi Port represents a transformative step forward for Zanzibar's southern region, aligning with the government's vision to enhance economic growth and regional connectivity.

Kizimkazi's proximity to Dar es Salaam offers a unique advantage, enabling the establishment of a ferry route that could connect the two areas in under an hour. This rapid transit option will streamline travel, reduce logistical costs, and enhance trade, while fostering closer ties between Zanzibar and mainland Tanzania. Additionally, the new port will create a vital link between Unguja and the mainland through Kunduchi, opening doors for trade and business opportunities.

Beyond its logistical importance, Kizimkazi Port is set to boost the tourism sector by connecting visitors to emerging hotspots like Makunduchi and Paje. These areas, known for cultural festivals and water sports, are gaining popularity as prime destinations. This ambitious project positions Kizimkazi as a gateway to growth, promoting regional trade, tourism, and economic development.

Revolutionizing Port Operations With E-Port

The government of Zanzibar, through the Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC), has taken a transformative step by digitalizing port operations with the introduction of the Electronic Portal (E-PORT) system. This innovative platform marks a significant shift in maritime logistics, aimed at streamlining operations, improving efficiency, and enhancing customer satisfaction. The E-PORT system is a cornerstone of ZPC's efforts to modernize port management, aligning Zanzibar with global standards and positioning its ports as hubs of regional trade and logistics.

The E-PORT system is more than a technological upgrade; it is a strategic overhaul of Zanzibar's maritime operations. Fully operational at Malindi Port through collaboration with AGL/ZMT, E-PORT is redefining port logistics and administration. Its key advantages include:

Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC) has significantly enhanced port operations through strategic digitalization efforts that bring efficiency, security, and improved stakeholder satisfaction. Reduced vessel turnaround times have been achieved by optimizing scheduling and cargo-handling processes, allowing vessels to spend less time docked and increasing overall port capacity. Streamlined logistics processes further minimize bottlenecks, enabling faster and more efficient cargo





movement for businesses and shipping agents. Advanced tracking and monitoring systems bolster security, ensuring the safety of vessels, cargo, and port facilities. Additionally, transparent and expedited procedures improve the customer experience, benefiting stakeholders across the supply chain.

Central to ZPC's digital transformation are four integrated components that redefine port operations. The Fleet Fuel Management System (FFMS) monitors fuel consumption across the port's fleet, promoting cost efficiency and environmental sustainability. The Terminal Operating System (TOS) optimizes cargo operations by streamlining container handling and terminal workflows.

Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) provides a comprehensive solution for managing financial and human resources, ensuring accountability and operational efficiency. Lastly, the Vessel Traffic System (VTS), a radar-based module, enhances maritime safety by guiding vessels, monitoring traffic, and mitigating risks at sea. Together, these pillars position ZPC as a

The Zanzibar Port Improvement Charter focuses on four main objectives: streamlining port operations, enhancing customer experience, driving economic growth, and promoting sustainability. Key strategies include implementing standardized procedures to minimize inefficiencies, fostering transparency, and adopting a customer-centric approach to meet the needs of traders and shipping lines.

The Charter also emphasizes the importance of environmentally responsible practices, aligning with international standards and integrating green technologies to minimize the ecological impact of port activities.

The following testimonies from Master Ocean Cargo and Fexmon Logistics & Freight Limited as well as Zanzibar Freight Forwarders Bureau, demonstrate the dramatic effect of these advancements and their hopeful outlook.

However, the transformation we've witnessed since the Zanzibar Maritime Authority (ZMT) took over is remarkable. The construction of the new ports at Maruhubi and Mangapwani has been a game-changer for us. These facilities are state-of-the-art, with ample space and modern systems that significantly reduce docking times. The introduction of container docking in Pemba has also opened up new opportunities, making the movement of goods more seamless and efficient. Bureaucratic processes have been streamlined, and the use of digital systems has made our work faster and more reliable. Today, we receive fewer complaints, and our clients are happier than ever.

Looking ahead, we are optimistic about the future. With the current momentum, we expect Zanzibar to become a hub for international trade in the next five years. We hope to see further digital advancements and increased connectivity with global ports, which will undoubtedly enhance our operations and cement Zanzibar's position as a leading trade destination."

"For years, the challenges we faced as clearing and forwarding agents in Zanzibar were immense. Before 2020, the inefficiencies at the ports often left us struggling to meet client expectations. Delays were commonplace due to a lack of proper infrastructure and cumbersome bureaucratic processes. The limited space at the old ports meant vessels often had to wait longer to dock, creating delays for businesses and traders. We constantly dealt with complaints, which sometimes led to losing clients to other regions with more efficient ports.

Moreover, the layers of bureaucracy added an extra burden, often causing frustration for us and our clients. It was a constant battle to ensure that operations ran smoothly.

Zanzibar's ports have long served as critical lifelines for trade in East Africa. However, before 2020, the challenges at these ports created significant barriers for traders and clearing agents. The inefficiencies due to outdated infrastructure, limited docking space, and slow operations often resulted in prolonged ship stays—up to 14 days in some cases—causing traders to incur additional costs.

The situation improved drastically with the development of new port facilities and streamlined operations, reducing ship docking times from 14 days to just 5 days. This transformation is commendable and has greatly enhanced the overall efficiency of our ports. Initiatives like the construction of the Maruhubi and Fumba Ports the addition of Mkoani container docks are indeed a testament to the government's commitment to modernizing Zanzibar's maritime infrastructure. These efforts have positioned Zanzibar as a growing hub for international trade.

Nonetheless, a significant issue persists: recent advancements have not yet addressed our operational costs. The introduction of new management at Malindi Port and the establishment of the Zanzibar Inland Container Depot (ICD) at Maruhubi aim to minimise both time and costs effectively. As the Zanzibar Freight Forwarders Bureau, we promote the reduction of operating costs. With the opening of the ICD, we anticipated cost reductions resulting from shorter ship stays. However, expenses have risen, particularly regarding fees for ship presence and container handling, resulting in duplicate payments. Regrettably, the anticipated cost-saving advantages of the dry port have not been achieved.

We strongly support the government's initiatives to enhance port operations. However, we urge the authorities to address this issue as soon as possible. One solution could be restructuring the fee system to replace the costs previously incurred due to delays with a single, transparent charge for handling and transferring containers. This would alleviate the financial strain on traders and ensure that the improved efficiency translates to tangible economic benefits for all stakeholders.



Similarly, the two lighthouses in Pemba, including Ras Kigomasha (1904), boast unique features like cast iron construction and picturesque surroundings. 

Tumbatu Lighthouse (Mwana wa Mwana)




Chumbe Lighthouse




Matumbe Makupa Lighthouse





United Petroleum, founded in 2006 in Mtoni, has developed to become the market leader in Zanzibar's petroleum business. In 2023, the firm moved to Mwangapwani, making it the first petroleum company to establish a depot in this important location. The Revolutionary Government of Zanzibar chose Mwangapwani as an excellent site for ports and petroleum bunkers, ensuring that depots are remote from residential areas.

United Petroleum's cutting-edge depot, built at a cost of \$10 million, can provide Zanzibar's energy requirements for up to 45 days. The facility has tanks for 8 million litres of petrol, 8 million litres of diesel, 4 million litres of jet fuel and 1 million litres of kerosene. Advanced safety measures include automated fire systems with sensors and three specialised fire pumps,

which provide the highest levels of operating security.

United Petroleum is committed to quality and innovation, supplying petrol, diesel, kerosene and jet fuel while providing flawless service execution. The firm has Zanzibar's biggest depot and a Lloyds-class tanker that is available for charter.

United Petroleum, which now operates 20 retail stations in Zanzibar, aims to expand into mainland Tanzania by opening seven more stations every year. The firm continues to provide energy solutions that are safer, greener, and more efficient for the onshore bunkering, commercial, and retail sectors.



A 5-Year Transformation

According to the statistics provided by the Zanzibar Bureau of Statistics, the Zanzibar Port Corporation has shown amazing growth and development between the years 2019 and 2023. These enhancements highlight the crucial importance that the port plays in propelling Zanzibar's change in terms of both its economy and its logistics.

There has been a consistent increase in the number of passengers, which is projected to rise from 2.56 million in 2019 to 2.88 million in 2023. This 12.6% increase is a reflection of the port's increased ability to accommodate travellers from both the United States and other countries overseas. Similarly, the number of voyages entering and departing Zanzibar increased from 9,712 in 2019 to an astonishing 10,779 in 2023, indicating a rise in marine activity. This represented a significant increase.

It is a credit to the enhanced port infrastructure and operating efficiency that the cargo throughput saw tremendous growth, increasing from only 391,000 tonnes in 2019 to over 2.17 million tonnes in 2023. There was also a significant increase in the amount of container handling, which saw 81,501 TEUs handled in 2023, compared to 70,461 TEUs processed in 2021.

During the year 2023, there were 125 vessels reported, which is a little increase from the number of 124 vessels that were recorded in 2019. For the year 2019, there were 124 boats.

ourism has become one of the most significant pillars of Zanzibar's blue economy, alongside the fisheries and maritime sectors as a vital contributor to the island's sustainable development. Since the 1990s, Zanzibar has relied heavily on tourism to drive its economic growth, and today, the sector accounts for approximately 32% of the country's GDP. With its pristine beaches, rich cultural heritage, and strategic position in the Indian Ocean, Zanzibar has cemented its reputation as a global tourism hotspot.

The Zanzibar Ports Corporation (ZPC) is pivotal in supporting the tourism sector. As the entry point for international visitors arriving by sea, ZPC manages maritime logistics and fosters the growth of cruise and ferry tourism. From 2020 to 2023, ZPC demonstrated its ability to adapt to challenges and seize opportunities, ultimately contributing to Zanzibar's post-pandemic recovery and tourism industry growth.



Ship Arrivals (2020-2023)

The COVID-19 pandemic severely disrupted global travel, including cruise tourism. Zanzibar's ports saw a dramatic decline in arrivals, with only seven cruise ships docking in 2019 compared to 28 in 2018. Passenger numbers fell by over 75%, and stringent health protocols were implemented to ensure safety.







2021: Gradual Recovery

As international vaccination campaigns progressed, cruise operations cautiously resumed. ZPC reopened its ports with enhanced health measures, welcoming 15 cruise ships and approximately 10,000 passengers. Partnerships with local operators and the introduction of themed cruises began to rebuild momentum.

2022: Accelerated Growth

With relaxed travel restrictions and strategic marketing campaigns, Zanzibar experienced a sharp increase in cruise arrivals. ZPC recorded 38 ships carrying 28,000 passengers, a 153% rise from the previous year.

2023: A Record-Breaking Year

Investments in port infrastructure and streamlined immigration processes led to an all-time high of 52 cruise ships and over 40,000 passengers.

The cruise tourism boom has had a profound impact on Zanzibar's economy. Direct spending by passengers and crew generated over USD 15 million from 2020 to 2023, fueling demand for local goods, souvenirs, and excursions. Jobs in sectors such as hospitality, artisanal crafts, and tour guiding expanded, supported by training programs to enhance local skills.

By leveraging digital platforms, strengthening international partnerships, and involving local communities, ZPC and the tourism sector can unlock new opportunities, ensuring the sustainable growth of Zanzibar's blue economy.

The partnership between Zanzibar Ports Corporation and the tourism sector is a cornerstone of the island's economic strategy. From enabling cruise tourism to fostering cultural preservation and sustainable development, ZPC's role has been instrumental in driving growth. As Zanzibar recovers and evolves, this symbiotic relationship will remain essential for shaping a prosperous and sustainable future.
